#### Beta Service in heavy use

On 25 July 2008 the <u>Australian Newspapers Beta</u> service was launched to the public. The Beta service contains 360,000 newspaper pages from 1803 onwards (3.5 million articles). The Library is receiving lots of good feedback from the public on the service, and will continue development of the Beta service over the next few months.

#### 1.5 million pages scanned

The National Library of Australia, in collaboration the Australian State and Territory libraries, has commenced a program to digitise out of copyright newspapers.



We are creating a free online service that will enable full-text searching of newspaper articles. This will include newspapers published in each state and territory from the 1800s to the mid-1950s, when copyright applies. The first Australian newspaper, published in Sydney in 1803, is included in the Program.


### AUSTRALIAN NEWSPAPERS DIGITISATION PROGRAM TEXT-CORRECTORS HALL OF FAME

Automatically extracting text from scans of old newspapers is extremely challenging. Although this project is using the best available Optical Character Recognition (OCR) software, the condition of the images it has to process combined with the frequently small fonts used means that many errors of interpretation are made.

Thankfully, many people have stepped in to correct the text and in so doing have made a wonderful contribution to this resource. The following table lists by month the people who've corrected the most lines of text.



#### NEWSPAPER INFORMATION

The Canberra Times newspaper was founded in 1926 in Canberra, Australia by Arthur Shakespeare.

It was the second paper to be printed in the city, the first being The Federal Capital Pioneer. The paper was sold to the Fairfax group in the 1960s by Arthur Shakespeare on the condition that it continue to advocate for Canberra. It was later sold to Publishing and Broadcasting Limited, which in turn sold it to Kerry Stokes in 1989 for \$110 million. Rural Press Limited bought the paper from Stokes in 1998 for \$160 million. The paper first went online on 31 March 1997.





On 25 July 2008 the <u>Australian Newspapers Beta</u> service was launched to the public. The Beta service contains 360,000 newspaper pages from 1803 onwards (3.5 million articles).
