CONSORTIA: CLASSIFICATION AND PURPOSE

- In existence many years – classification: subject, library type, geography, combination
- Collaboration: barrier free info access
- State-of-the-art training
- Exchange of ideas to link people, info, IT
- Initiate new services – not afford on own
- Experimentation
- Marketing and advocacy channel
- Communication
- Buying clubs?

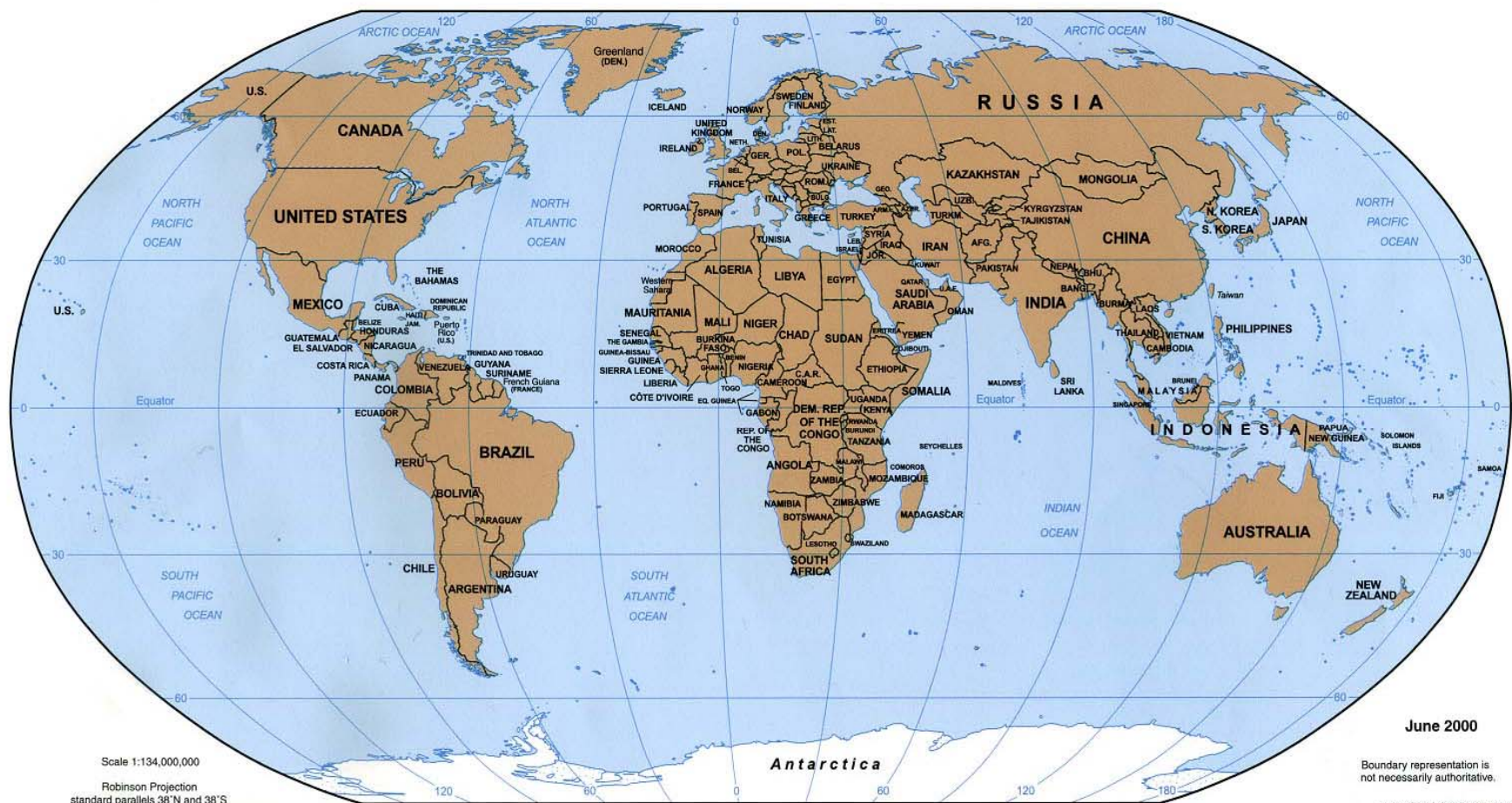
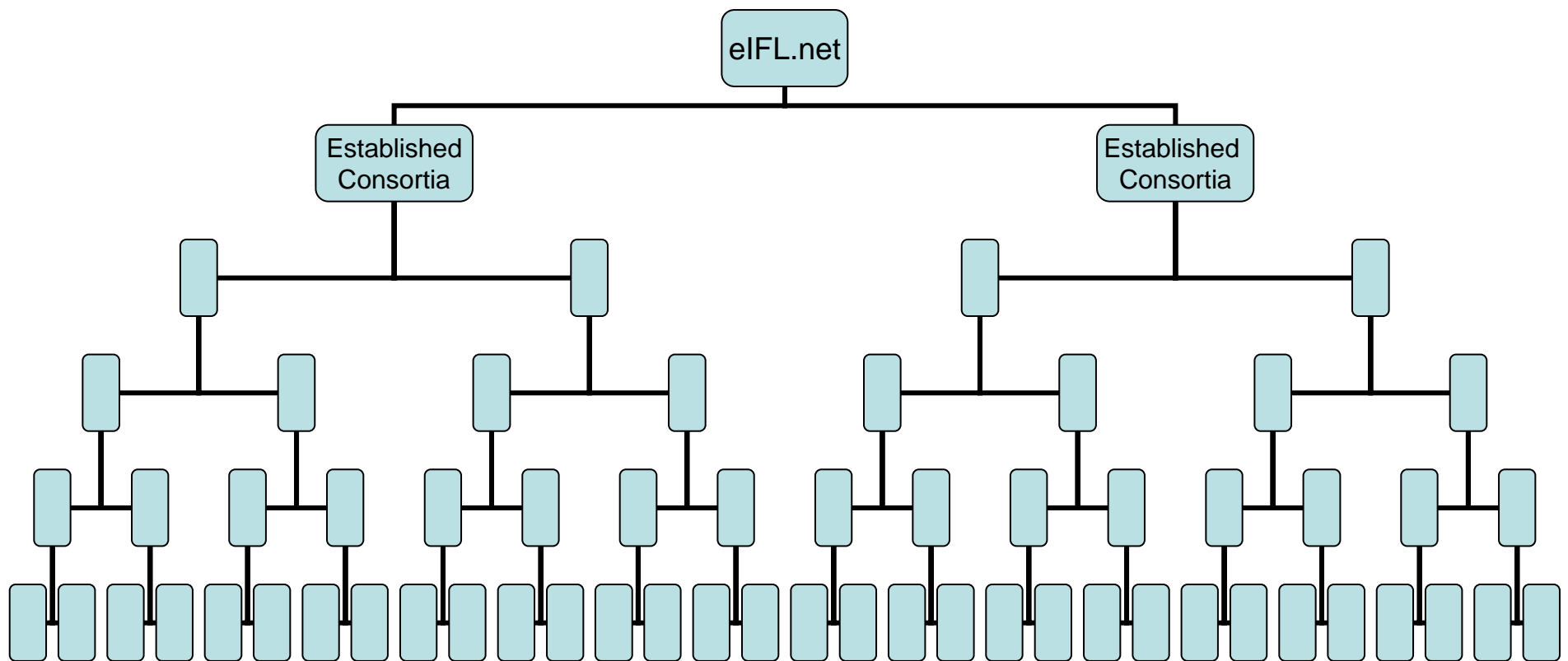


DIAGRAM OF PRINCIPLE

- Start with one, this one builds two, these two build four, four build 16, etc.



LIBRARY CONSORTIUM BUILDING

- Program according to country needs in consultation with organisers
- At least two days, preferably more
- Day One: Introduction, general overview, case studies
- Day Two: Detail and workshops, process and program ahead, local responsible team
- Follow-up with organisers

LIBRARY CONSORTIUM BUILDING PROGRAM

- Principle: General theory to specifics
- Culture sensitive, culture specific
- Context/background: Opening, introductions, aim and objectives, country specific overview
- Consortium approach – general introduction
- Consortium of consortia: eIFL.net, ICOLC
- Case studies: international (as many as possible)
 - Successes and lessons learnt

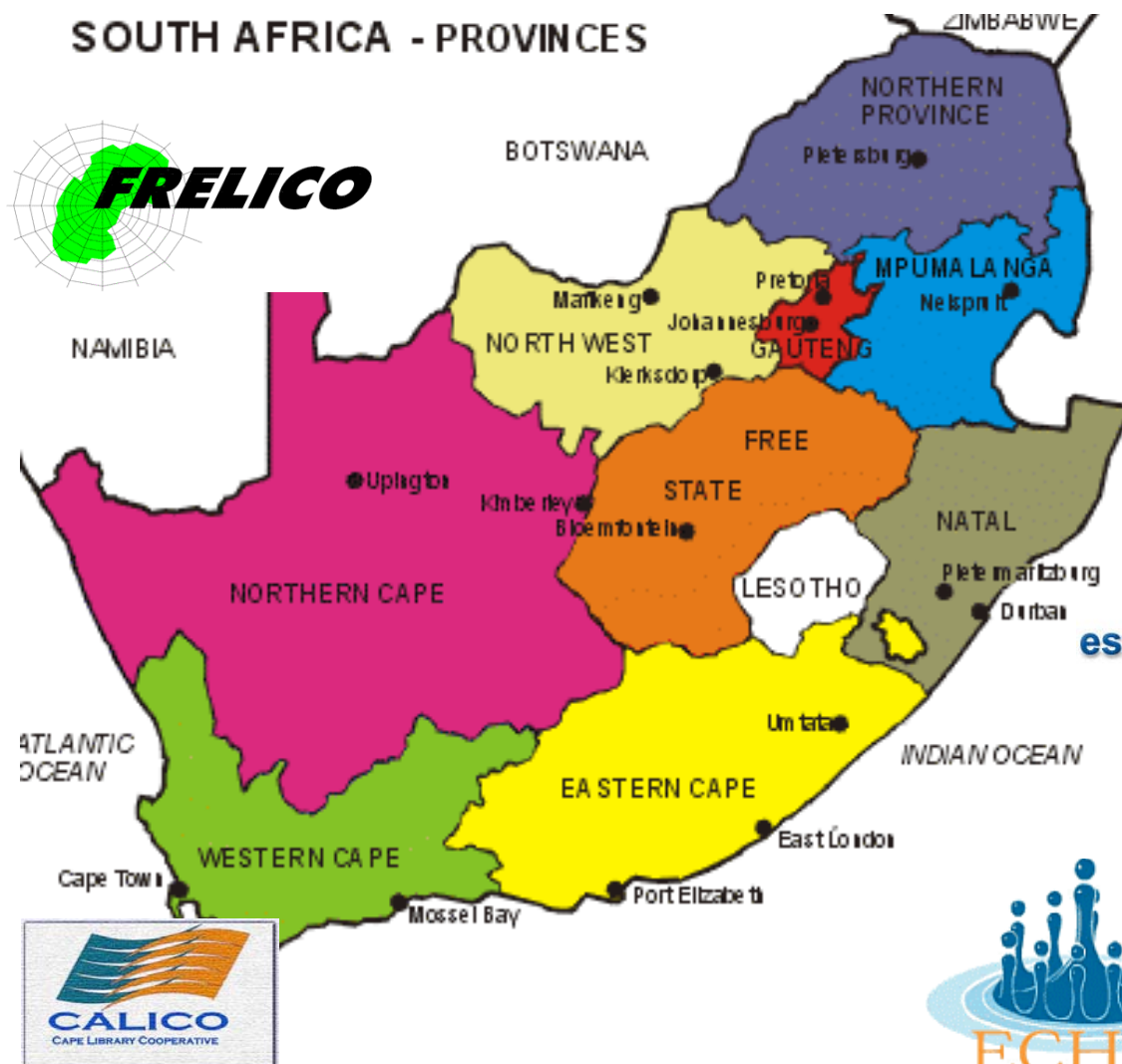
LIBRARY CONSORTIUM BUILDING PROGRAM (2)

CONSORTIA: SA DEVELOPMENT

- Regional SA: SEALS informal academic forum (1989) CALICO formal (1992) and others followed; SANRIC (2003)
- National consortia - SA: Coalition of South African Library Consortia: COSALC (1999)
- Vision: enhance **access to information** and the **sharing of resources** to benefit the **clients** of library consortia in South Africa through national **cooperation**

CONSORTIA: SA DEVELOPMENT(2)

- **Objectives**
- **National level:** promoting and supporting national co-operative initiatives
- **Affordable and equitable access to information**
- National and international partnerships and agreements
- Partnership and contribution to establishment of national infra-structures
- National strategy for access to electronic information

- Donors, funders and sponsors



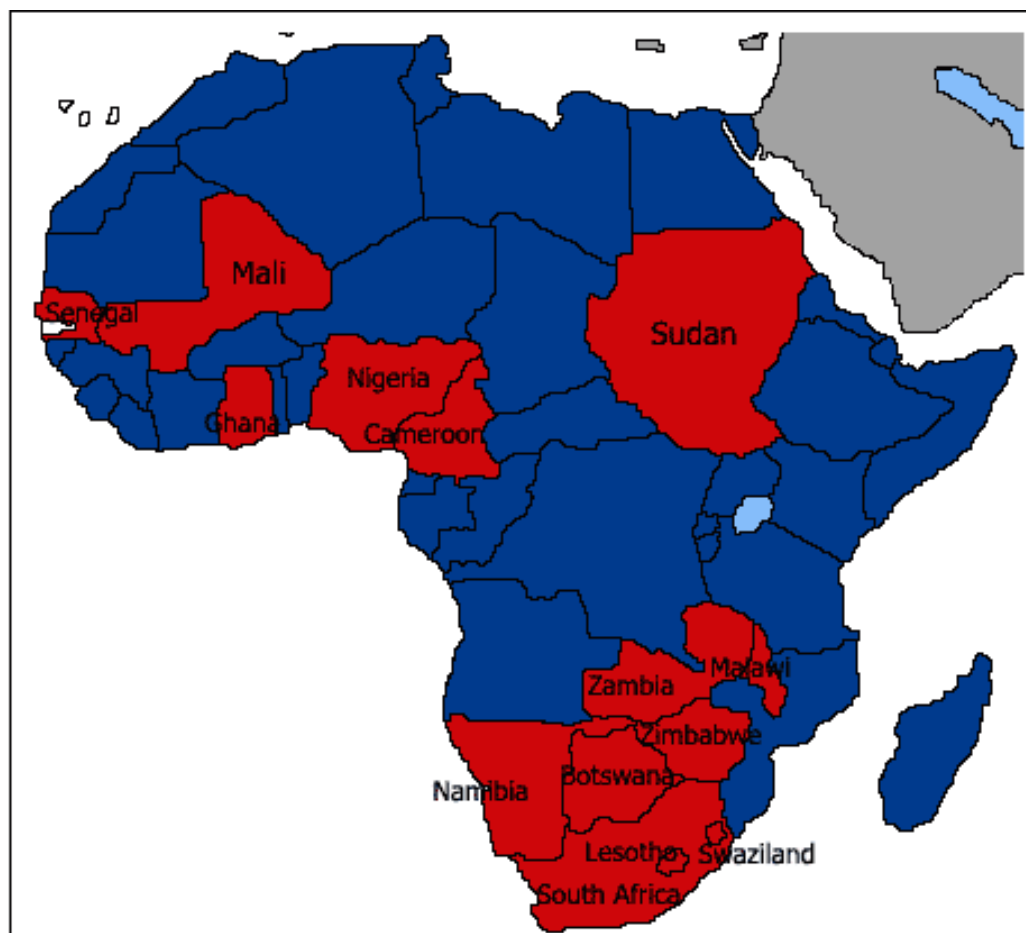
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CONSORTIA DEVELOPMENT: AFRICA

- The concept: *Stokvel*
- COSALC & Consortium building directly involved: China, Ghana, Namibia, Nigeria, Senegal, Zambia,
- 2001: Survey of SA & bordering countries (1)
- 2004 Africa: 14 countries (est. or in process)
 - **Southern Africa:** Botswana, Lesotho, Malawi, Namibia, South Africa, Swaziland, Zambia, Zimbabwe
 - **Central and East Africa:** Cameroon, Sudan, Uganda
 - **West Africa:** Ghana, Mali, Nigeria, Senegal

SADC SURVEY

- COSALC enquiries received from SADC countries since establishment
- eIFL Coordinators' meeting Budapest: 2000
- Sample: One institution per SADC country
- Survey divided in 2 sections
 - Consortia
 - EBSCOHost
- 66% response

SADC SURVEY (2)

- 1 academic national consortium (7 members)
- Funding equally divided
- Limiting factors: Funding; IT infrastructure; Training
- Need assistance to further develop
 - e-journal subs
 - train staff to manage projects for these facilities

SADC SURVEY (3)

- Attempts to establish: 2 Yes, 3 No
- Interested to establish: 4 Yes, 1 No
- Top 3 projects - resource sharing
- Weighted limiting factors:
 - IT Infrastructure (43)
 - Expertise in consortium building (39)
 - Funding (37)
 - Training (37)
 - Staffing (33)
 - Management (31)
 - Marketing (29)
 - Leadership (28)

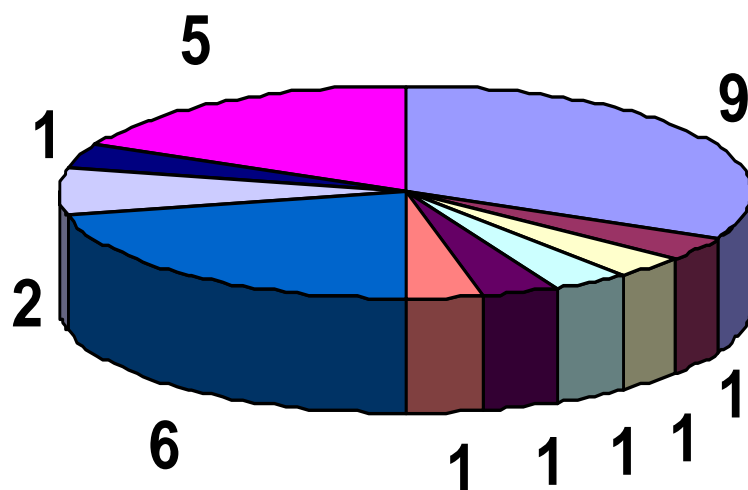
SADC SURVEY (4)

- Assistance to establish: 4 Yes, 2 No
- SADC library consortium : 6 Yes
- African library consortium: 5 Yes, 1 Yes but functional sub-regions
- Multi-country consortium: 5 Yes, 1 Yes but first an African library consortium

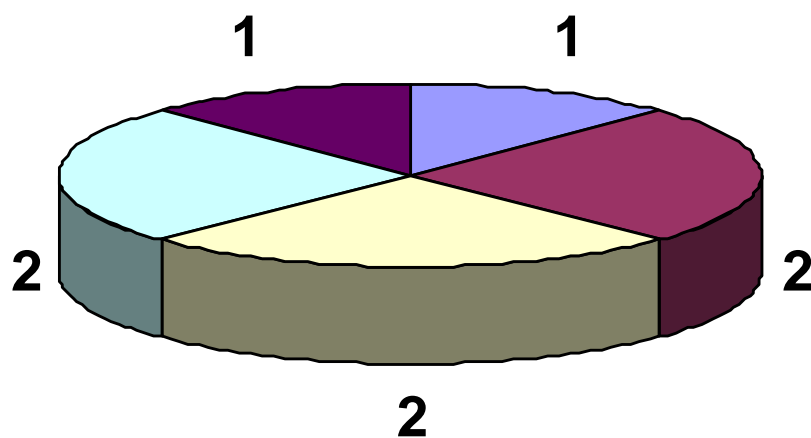

CONSORTIA: CHALLENGES

- Sustainability and funding (4)
- Participation levels of members (3)
- Capacity – volunteers
- Connectivity (incl. national infrastructure)
- Marketing and communication
- Registration process
- Focus on core business
- Building multi-sector consortium
- Skills: Negotiation, proposal writing, marketing
- e-Environment: Changing role of LIS & librarians

CONSORTIA: FUTURE

- Add value: Improve access and use of resources
- Scholarly information: Open Access
- Scholar's portals (Jerry Campbell)
 - Enhanced services (digital reference services) promote use, allow cross searching, support document delivery, areas of shared workspaces to further initiatives
- Strategic inter-consortium partnerships
 - Fewer consortia, remaining larger, more powerful
- Transition: buying clubs to innovation

CONSORTIA: FUTURE (2)

- Inter-library alliances
 - Librarian freelance alliance: partners for client libraries in spec identified need or “time-sensitive” opportunity
- Current site license: temporary state of affairs-adaptation & development
 - More flexible purchasing models
 - Combined core subs & transactional based payments
- Emergence of smaller publishers
- Multi-publisher consortium? – smaller society publishers clusters (PCG’s *Consortialink*)

CONCLUSION

 - Library & information workers, publishers and clients
- Consortia here to stay?
 - evolving roles
- Strategic partnerships and relationships
