

Overview: What is Open Access?

- Open-access (OA) literature is digital, online, free of charge, and free of most copyright and licensing restrictions. (from Peter Suber's Open Access Overview, at http://www.earlham.edu/~peters/fos/overview.htm)
- Focus of the Open Access movement is peerreviewed scholarly research article.
- Two main approaches to open access: publishing (gold) & self-archiving (green).

Flavors of open access

true open access - immediate open access, no restrictions

author copyright

delayed (embargoed) open access

limited access (e.g. free, but on publishers' site only)

How does Open Access differ from Open Source?

Open Source - open code (can be modified)

- must sharealike
- not necessarily free

How does Open Access differ from Creative Commons?

- Creative Commons
 - author selects permissions from a menu
 - easily let users / readers know what is allowed
 - some open access publishers use Creative Commons licensing
 - Creative Commons Canada site: http://creativecommons.org/

Open access business models

- Most OA journals do not charge article processing fees
- Volunteer & in-kind
- Sponsorship or subsidy
- Efficient software helps
- Article Processing Fees
- Advertising
- New approaches library / publishing cooperatives?

Describe the Pros and Cons of Open Access Publishing

- Pros: research impact
- lower costs (no subscription tracking, authentication)

- Cons: generating revenue
- Specific requirements to be in DOAJ etc.
- Direct import function to Library catalogues

- Choose your OA model
- Establish scope, content, purpose
- Select the Editorial Board experienced and reputable
- Editorial Support
- Documentation

···setting up···

- Quality assurance is essential!
 - Maintain high standards
 - Encouraging and supportive environment
 - Must be regular practice
- Devoted time
 - Can be very time consuming
 - Strict schedules and deadlines

- Peer reviewing
- Copyediting
- Indexing
- Mentoring
- Not limited to library journals
- Research
- Participation with Library Associations and Conferences
